### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of Understanding (hereinafter referred to as "MoU") is entered into on *01.08.2021* by and betweenLET US DREAM aPublic Charitable Trust (hereinafter referred to as "First Party" which expression, unless excluded by or be repugnant to the subject or context thereof, shall be deemed to include its successors-in-office, administrators and permitted assigns) having its(Let Us Dream Trust, DRC Post, Bangalore, Karnataka) is a Public Charitable Trust (173/18)

### AND

**Loyola College of Social Sciences,** Sreekariyam - Aakkulam Rd, Bapuji Nagar, Sreekariyam, Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala 695017, (hereinafter referred to as "Second Party" which expression, unless excluded by or be repugnant to the subject or context thereof, shall be deemed to include its successors-in-office, administrators and permitted assigns), represented by Saji P Jacob, Principal Loyola College, as SECOND PARTY.

(First Party and Second Party are hereinafter jointly referred to as 'Parties' and individually as 'Party')

### WHEREAS

- A) The First Party (Let Us Dream Trust, DRC Post, Bangalore, Karnataka) is a Public Charitable Trust (173/18)
- B) First Party & Second Party believe that collaboration and co-operation between themselves will promote more effective use of each of their resources, and provide each of them with enhanced opportunities.
- C) The Parties intent to cooperate and focus their efforts on cooperation within the areas of organizing Community Conferences, Community Service-learning projects, Psychosocial skills development programs, which will benefit students and also the community at large.
- D) Both Parties, being legal entities in themselves desire to sign this MOU for advancing their mutual interests.
- E) Loyola College of Social Sciences, Sreekariyam Aakkulam Rd, Bapuji Nagar, Sreekariyam, Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala 695017, the Second Party is an academic organization with higher education institution run by the Kerala Province of the Society of Jesus in Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala, India

NOW THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION OF THE MUTUAL PROMISES SET FORTH IN THIS MOU, THE PARTIES HERE TO AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

### **CLAUSE 1 CO-OPERATION**

- **1.1** Both Parties are united by common interests and objectives, and they shall establish channels of communication and co-operation that will promote and advance their respective operations within the **Institution** and its related wings. The Parties shall keep each other informed of potential opportunities and shall share all information that may be relevant to secure additional opportunities for one another **for the larger benefit the society.**
- 1.2 First Party and Second Party co-operation will facilitate effective utilization of the intellectual capabilities, Social commitments, Unique visions of the Individuals associated with the First Party and Second Party in providing significant inputs to Organize and execute Community Conference, Service learningprograms and psychosocial development programs keeping in mind the needs of students and the society at large
- 1.3 The general terms of co-operation shall be governed by this MOU. The Parties shall cooperate with each other and shall, as promptly as is reasonably practical, enter into all relevant agreements, deeds and documents (the 'Definitive Documents') as may be required to give effect to the actions contemplated in terms of this MOU. The term of Definitive Documents shall be mutually decided between the Parties. Along with the Definitive Documents, this MOU shall represent the entire understanding as to the subject matter hereof and shall supersede any prior understanding between the Parties on the subject matter hereof.

### **CLAUSE 2 SCOPE OF THE MoU**

2.1 Any other program organized jointly can be planned and executed on mutually agreed terms, including exploring the possibility of future joint research possibilities.

### **CLAUSE 3 INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY**

**3.1** Training materials provided/developed specifically for this particular Community Conferenceis theintellectual property the First Party and can be used by the Second Party.

### **CLAUSE 4 VALIDITY**

- 4.1 This Agreement will be valid for 1yr from the date of Signing the MOU
- 4.2 Both Parties may terminate this MOU upon 30 calendar days' notice in writing. In the event of Termination, both parties have to discharge their obligations.

Any divergence or difference derived from the interpretation or application of the MoU shall be resolved in the agreement of discussion between both parties. This undertaking is to be construed in accordance with Indian Law with exclusive jurisdiction in the Courts of Kerala

# LET US DREAM ANNUAL COMMUNITY CONFERENCE, LOYOLA COLLEGE OF SOCIAL SCIENCES, DEC 4 2021.

The Let Us Dream Community Conference was hosted at Loyola College of Social Sciences, Trivandrum in collaboration with Christ University, Bangalore. Let Us Dream is a concept put forward by FrLijo Thomas CMI and the purpose of this annual conference is to provide a forum for professionals, scholars, researchers, and students to share and discuss ideas, activities and challenges in their respective efforts. The Let Us Dream Conference was launched in 2017 at Louisiana Tech University in USA, and has since travelled to many parts of the world. In 2021, the Let Us Dream conference was organized at two universities each in USA and India. In India, this conference was organized in Jyoti Nivas College in Bangalore and at Loyola College, Trivandrum.

The theme for this year's annual conference hosted at Loyola College was Community Collaboration in Times of the Pandemic. Three panel discussions focussing on the Social, Health and the Education Sectors comprised the core of the conference. The conference was inaugurated by Shri K R Jyotilal IAS (Principal Secretary, Govt of Kerala), who spoke of the importance of voluntarism.

The Social panel discussions brought forth a rich diversity of panellists, viz. Ar. P B Sajan (Costford), Ms Tiffany Brar (Jyotirgamaya Foundation), Ms Sonia George (SEWA), Dr Premkumar (Social Activist) and Ms Latha Indira (People for Animals). Ar PB Sajan spoke of the innovative housing strategies employed by COSTFORD in slum housing projects at Chengalchoolha and Karimadom Colony, Ms Tiffany Brar spoke of her journey as a visually impaired person which spurred her to work for the rights of this section of society. Ms Sonia George spoke of the denial of rights of the large informal work force; especially the women and Ms Latha Indira spoke of the need to protect the rights of animals. Dr Premkumar emphasised the need for voluntarism amongst students.

The Education Panel included Dr K G Thara (former Member of the SDMA) who spoke of the need for youth to be inspired by nature and the delicate balance between human societies and the natural environment. Ms Jolly Johnson from H2O spoke of her experiences in working with autistic children. Mr M C Rajilan spoke of the challenges precipitated by online education during the pandemic.

The Health Panel consisted of Dr Chandramohan (RCC), Mr Shijin Varghese and Mr Jimmy Manuel (Haemophilia Foundation of India). Dr Chandramohan spoke of the challenges the state faces due to the increasing spread of cancer and the increased problems that cancer patients faced during the pandemic. Jimmy Manuel spoke of his experiences in providing support to people with haemophilia and the need for early detection.

### WELCOME, PRESISENTIAL ADDRESS & CONFERENCE OVERVIEW

The facilitators Dr. Jyothi Krishnan (Head of the Department of Disaster Management), Dr. Saji P Jacob (Principal, Loyola College of Social Sciences) and Jimmy Manuel (Regional Council Secretary, Hemophilia Federation of India) were on hand to open the conference. The event began with the prayer song by the college choir. Dr.Jyothi Krishnan welcomed all the dignitaries including K R Jyothilal IAS, Dr. Saji P Jacob, Fr Dr. Sabu P Thomas (Vice Principal), Lijo Thomas (Christ University), Jimmy Manuel and Dr. Prakash P Pillai (HOD HRM), and students to the conference.

Dr. Saji P Jacob presided over the function. He delivered the presidential address on the importance and need of Community Collaboration. Jimmy Manuel gave an overview of 'Let us Dream' and introduced the idea behind the conference. He explained the objectives and the value propositions of the community conference such as globally located conference, promoting solutions, believing in a vision of global inclusions, focused on the local community, targeting volunteers, bridging researchers and practitioners etc.



K R Jyothilal IAS, Principal Secretary, Government of Kerala inaugurated the programme by lighting the lamp.

### **KEYNOTE ADDRESS**

The opening keynote speaker was K R Jyothilal IAS, Principal Secretary, Government of Kerala. He had delivered insights on several subjects like sociology, psychology etc. He expanded the word LIFE as "Look Inside For Everything" and said that each person is a combination of different factors. So if we want to know about them, then look deep into them. He mentioned that development of a person happens in one's own mind. Each person is a reflection of God and everyone should find their inner love for themselves. 'Unity in Diversity' could be seen if everyone looked at themselves. He concluded by mentioning the importance of volunteerism and quoted "Go to sleep with good thoughts. Before going to sleep, just think about your wish, and repeat it every day, then it will come true in the future"

Along with that, K R Jyothilal IAS released the book on Triennial International Let us Dream Virtual Conference 2020 and it was received by Principal, Dr. Saji P Jacob. A memento was given to A K Jyothilal IAS by Vice Principal Fr Dr. Sabu P Thomas as a token of gratitude.

Fr Dr. Sabu P Thomas felicitated the programme and the session concluded with a vote of thanks by Dr. Prakash P Pillai, Head of the Department of Human Resource Management.

# SOCIAL PANEL

The Social panel was embraced with five panellists. It began with the presentation of **Shri P.B Sajan, an architect of COSTFORD** organization. The seminar titled 'Transformation of slums through community building' is a project focused on the development of slums in Kerala i.e. chenkalchoola and karimadom colony, Thiruvananthapuram. The prime mission of this project was to eradicate poverty and to provide a decent livelihood to the people living in the slums. This included housing development i.e. to provide people with neatly furnished house with basic amenities, providing education to children with the setting up of Anganwadis and to provide various health facilities. Besides that women empowerment was also a priority of this project, where active participation of woman were shown, which largely impacted this project as a whole. With this project, around 560 houses were built with water facilities, electricity and drainage system. During the Covid-19 pandemic, vaccines were provided through various health care centers and various volunteers where appointed to monitor the covid patients and people exposed to it.

The second panellist of this session was **Tiffany Brar,the founder of Jyothirgamaya Foundation,**which is a nonprofit organization based in Trivandrum, which is actively involved in the empowerment of people with visual impairment.She spoke about the mistreatment faced by the blind people in India. According to her, the service in India to help visually impaired people were still in its primitive stage and people still don't know how to deal with them. Tiffany shared her experiences of discrimination faced at her younger age where she was excluded from all kind of activities just because she was blind. This experience led to the origin of Jyothirgamaya, this organization has helped several visually impaired people to get a better life. They provide activities such as spoken English, yoga, music, interpersonal skills, paragliding and every other support needed. According to her, she had broken several barriers faced by blind people and wants others to do the same. She concluded her session by saying 'not to do what you can't, but to do as much as you can''.

"When you extend your philanthropic arms towards the world, the whole Universe comes to your aid"This was the nutshell of the session presented by **Dr.Premkumar, a social activist** and the third panelist of the social panel. He is a person who works day and night to feed the hungry and to uplift the downtrodden of the society. The journey of Dr.Premkumar as a social activist began with sad sight of a mentally challenged individual searching for food from garbage. This ignited the fire in him and he began a sojourn of social activism. He commenced with the distribution of food packets for the mentally challenged people found at the streets. Later he extended his 'Feeding the Hungry' programs in Government run hospitals, especially on *hartal* days, which later many other NGO'S holdup. The inspiring presentation ended with an invitation to add beauty to the world through volunteerism.

Sonia George is a member of SEWA (Self Employed Women's Association) and the forth speaker of the Social panel. As a part of the SEWA movement in Kerala, Miss Sonia George has been campaigning and advocating for the rights of women in the informal sector.She pointed out certain problems that currently burning in the society such as mistreatment of women in workspace and unpaid labor. Women are working for very low wages as house maid and other unhealthy jobs for security andthese workers are not allowed to use private bathrooms, not allowed to eat with everyone in the house and also they are forced to sleep in the kitchen at night. She also emphasized on the wage difference between men and women, where women earn less compared to men for the same work. To address this issue of

women's wages is not an easy task. One can't speak about a job unless we talk about workspace, family conditions, unequal wages etc.she concluded the discussion by asking aspiring social workers to take this as a challenge and bring political changes to it.

The fifth and last speaker of the social panel was **Smt. Latha Indira, the Secretary of People for Animals (PFA), Trivandrum,** a nonprofit animal welfare organisation and has been carrying out rescue activities. PFA opens arms of care, protection & love to every animal as far as our reach extends and for as long as they need us. She started PFA in 1996, with limited number of facilities and now they have more than hundred volunteers in which they conduct adoption programs, vaccination camps, sterilization, awareness programs etc. She spoke about the importance of animal welfare, prevention of exploitation, abuse, abandonment of animals and negligence of law in the field of these mentioned factors. She also pointed out that we humans need to change the attitude towards street animals. Many people think that humans only deserve welfare but in reality "Animal welfare is human welfare". She also talked about the importance of volunteering as it is a part of personal growth. It helps animals to lead fulfilling lives and it has many personal and professional benefits for humans too. She concluded that animal volunteers can peek into potential fields of interest, develop practical skills. Studies show that working with animals lowers stress levels and increases our sense of stability and meaning of life.

## **EDUCATION PANEL**

The Education panel consisted of three speakers and it began with **Mr. Rajilan, the Founder and Chairman of Research Academy for Creative Excellence (RACE).** He spoke about the pandemic induced digital addiction in children and adolescence. Mr Rajilan being a motivational speaker, counsellor, and training consultant, he shared his experience on how children become victims of Digitalism and also emphasised on the psychological, emotional, physical and mental consequences of becoming one. So in order to maintain a good social environment, we humans as a social creature should help each other to become constructive rather than destructive. As conclusion he spoke about the project initiated by RACE named "Dashavriksha" in which 153 plants have been planted and taken cared by children and also mentioned about "Karuthal", a training program on physical, mental and social wellbeing of adolescent girls. He urged everyone to be one with questions so that we can also build a society that is capable of asking questions ensuring equal rights to everyone.

The second speaker of the Education panel **was Dr. K G TARA, Former Head of Disaster Management.** She explained the importance of nature and about the quality of animals such as mutual trust and empathy that prompts them to protect their own habitat which we humans lack. She showed slide presentation about various natural spots such as Angel Waterfalls, Balancing Rocks in Zimbabwe etc. for understanding the critical bond that humans share with nature. She shared various stories of great personalities such as Albert Einstein, Walt Disney, Mary Kom, Avani Lekhara and spoke about their hardships which they had come across in their life overcoming social inequalities. She concluded her session by saying that, failure shouldn't be the opposite of success but a part of success as failure is the stepping stone to success and shared a story of how she was degraded as student and later on received the Young Scientist Award in 1993.

The third and last speaker of this panel was,**Jolly Johnson**, the founder of the Helping Hands Organization also known as H2O. Helping Hands Organization (H2O) started in 2012 is an organisation to provide support for disabled children. A project was proposed under her leadership named "DAFFODILS" which aims mainly at the well being of disabled children. This project was proposed to make the differently abled children to become independent and creative. H2O also conducts inclusive sessions for creating awareness to become good and responsible citizens. The organisation also focuses on sustainable development as part of that they had planted more than 18,000 trees with 95 species. She concluded the session by saying that everyone should have both passion and determination in order to succeed in life.

## **HEALTH PANEL**

The Health panel was consisted of 3 speakers the session began with **Dr. ChandraMohan, a member of Regional Cancer Centre.** This session was an awareness of cancer and he alarmed about the increasing number of cancer patients in Kerala and lack of treatment facilities. Cancer is known to be one of the deadliest diseases to be found. Some of the major causes of cancer areSmoking and Tobacco, lack of healthy Diet and Physical Activity, UV rays other types of radiation, viruses and other Infections etc. The rising number of cancer patients is mainly because of the lack of knowledge, poor lifestyle and health facilities. By improving these factors can dramatically change the current situation. To sum up, we can say that providing better care and staying healthy is the best way to prevent cancer

The second speaker of the Health panel was **Mr Shijin Varghees**, the member of **Santhwanam Charitable Trust**. He mentioned that it was during the COVID-19 pandemic that he really came into the health sector as at that time he witnessed the

shortage of blood in various blood banks and the reason behind the shortage was due to the myths and taboos that where prevailing in India. The Santhwanam charitable trust as a team they started a giving awareness camp which was very successful to an extent. He also spoke about the on-going free medical camps and many other programs for cancer patients as well as for palliative care. He concluded his session by pointing out the power of a smile and what all changes it can bring to an individual.

"1 in 5000 males in India suffers from Haemophilia" said Mr Jimmy Manuel, the third and final Heath panellists as well as the **President of Haemophilia Society** of Kerala. Haemophilia is a genetic disorder in which the patient bleeds continuously into the joints and muscles due to the absences of certain blood clotting proteins. Haemophilia Society of Kerala is a non Profit Charitable organisation under the guidance of Mr Jimmy Manuel. The main mission of this organization is to help people who are suffering from Haemophilia as well as to create awareness among people about this disease to provide support to the needed hands. The idea of this organisation arises when his son was diagnosed with Haemophilia in his babyhood. After certain experience he understood that treatment facilities for haemophilic patients are less in Kerala as well as in India. Even people who are aware of this disease are very few. These events lead to the establishment of the Haemophilia Society. After a lot of effort and hard work of many people now this organisation has been running successfully and been able to make changes in lot of people's life. The session concluded with a statement "Dream for a better world, if we didn't dream for it then no one would".

### SECOND KEYNOTE ADDRESS

The closing keynote speaker was A P Prejish who is an entrepreneurship trainer and public speaker. He owns a company named Nirbhaya Infotainments and an organisation on debating society and he had a research institute that is Nirbhaya institute of human development (NIHD) which focuses on training supporting mankind.

A P Prejish shared his life as a public speaker and the struggles and the mistakes he had committed while speaking in front of audience. He shared about the best techniques that can be used in our life that is 'RARE' which he defined as *Research Association Reference Exposure* and 'LSRW' which he meant is *Listening Speaking Reading* through which we can modify our speaking language and fluency.

In conclusion, he explains that everyone has their own perspective towards life, so it will be good if we consider everyone's aspect for betterment of the future. He made a quote 'Leaders are made and not born' which brings us to the insight that only through hard work and determination one can achieve their goals.
