

Founded in 1963, Loyola College of Social Sciences, is affiliated to the University of Kerala. The College is managed by the Kerala Province of the Society of Jesus. It offers courses in MA (Master of Arts in Sociology), MSW (Master of Social Work), MAHRM (Master of Arts in Human Resource Management), MSc CP (Master of Science in Counselling Psychology) and MSW DM (Master of Social Work in Disaster Management). Loyola College is a recognized research centre of the University of Kerala, preparing students for Ph.D (Sociology, Social Work & Management Studies). Programmes of the Centre for Adult Continuing Education and Extension (CACEE) of the university of Keral and also conducted at Loyola. A full-fledged Extension Department, Loyola Extension Services, is a unique feature of the College. The publication wing brings out a bi-annual journal, Loyola Journal of Social Sciences, and other occasional publications. We have an active alumni association founded in the year 1965.

#### **Students' Code of Conduct**

In keeping with the goals of Jesuit education, the following Code of Conduct are given to the students of the College.

#### A. General Discipline

- 1. Students of Loyola are expected to deeply imbibe the goals of Jesuit education and manifest the same in their behaviour. They must show mature responsibility, hard work and discipline.
- 2. We insist on daily attendance and punctuality in classes, library hours, special talks and seminars, association meetings, and any other curricular and extra-curricular programme notified by the Principal.
- 3. Students are not allowed to hold any public demonstration in the college premises except with permission from the Principal.
- 4. Indiscipline, irregularity and unbecoming manner of behaviour will be sufficient reasons for temporary or permnent deletion of a student from the College rolls.
- 5. Value Education, Social Analysis, street theatre, rural live- in camps, study tours and such other growth-oriented programmes will be compulsory and students are expected to actively participate in them.
- 6. Students not staying with their parents or near relatives must reside in the College hostels, or in hostels approved by the Principal.
- 7. All should take care of the College furniture, books and premises and any damage caused must be made good.

- 8. Students are forbidden to collect money for any purpose without the written permission of the Principal.
- 9. The relation between male and female students must be characterised by mutual respect and maturity.
- 10. All students should earnestly seek to live the ideals of Jesuit education and promote a genuine family spirit among the staff, students and College authorities.

#### B. Leave and Attendance Rules

- 1. The Semester certificate of attendance and progress required for promotion and for admission to the University Examination will not be granted unless:
  - a) The student has the attendance prescribed by the University for the course.
  - b) The student has completed the course of instruction to the satisfaction of the authorities of the College and
  - c) The student's progress in studies and conduct have been satisfactory.
- 2. Every absence from College or during college time must be informed to the HOD, Principal or the Vice Principal and teacher concerned in special cases of test/seminar presentations or other programmes. Absence for more than 3 days must be informed to the HOD and Principal or Vice Principal. On return from absence, the students shall submit a leave letter countersigned by the parent/guardian/warden. If the absence exceeds three days, medical certificate may be required.

#### C. Library Rules

- 1. Library being an important -learning resource, all are expected to make the best use of our College library. Adherence to library rules must be strict.
- 2. Keep Silence and do not make excessive noise or engage in any other activity that is likely to be disruptive or annoying to the library users.
- 3. The library will be open on all working days from 8.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m.
- 4. Books may be borrowed for fourteen days. Fine will be collected for delay in returning the books on time.
- 5. Computers in the Library should be used only for academic purposes.

#### D. Rules for the Collection of Fees

At the time of admission the fees for the first year has to be remitted and for the second year at the beginning of the second year. Caution deposits remaining unclaimed after six months of the due date will stand forfeited and credited to the government revenue.

#### E. Excursion, Picnics, Camps & Study Tour

1. Students are not permitted to organise or conduct Excursion, Picnics or Study tours without the knowledge and consent of both HOD and Principal.

- 2. Heads of the department concerned shall be contacted for necessary arrangements and a detailed programme of travel, stay, places of visit etc. should be submitted to the Principal.
- 3. Normally, there should be at least two teachers (a male and a female) to accompany each team.
- 4. A seven-day residential camp will be organized either in a slum or village during the course. Attendance is compulsory for the camp.

#### ANTI RAGGING

Supreme Court of India orders curbing Ragging in Educational Institutions.

"Ragging" means the following

Any conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness any other student, indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student or asking the students to do any act or perform something which such student will not in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student.

Punishable ingredients of Ragging

Abetment to Ragging; Criminal conspiracy to ragging; Unlawful assembly and rioting while ragging; Public nuisance created during ragging, Violation of decency and morals through ragging; Injury to body, Causing hurt or grievous hurt; Wrongful restraint; Wrongful confinement; Use of criminal force; Assault as well as sexual offences or unnatural offences; Extortion; Criminal trespass; Offences against property; Criminalintimidation; Attempts to commit any or all of the above mentioned offences against the victim(s); Physical or

psychological humiliation; All other offences following from the definition of "Ragging".

#### **Punishments**

Depending upon the nature and gravity of the offence as established by the Anti-Ragging Committee of the institute punishments as per UGC guidelines shall be given to those found guilty.

#### Sexual Harassment Complaints Committee

This committee is set up on the recommendations of the Kerala University to provide for the effective enforcement of the basic human right of gender equality and guarantee against sexual harassment and abuse.

#### **Student Support Programmes**

#### A. Certificate and Diploma Courses

The college conducts 9 certificate courses to supplement skills imparted by the curriculum.

#### **LCP 1- Street Theatre**

This course aims to impart various techniques used within the theatrical process to sensitise people on social issues and to reach out to the people.

#### LCP 2- Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA)

PRA is a problem-solving approach and through a bottom-up perspective. The course will give space to cultivate the art of need assessment and develop skills for project planning.

#### LCP 3- Life Skill

This course helps students to understand ten life skills identified by WHO and design your own module for the training.

#### LCP 4- Statistical Package for Social Sciences

This course provides hands on training to the students to get competent to apply the different statistical tools for quantitative data analysis.

#### **LCP 5- MS Excel**

This course covers a comprehensive understanding of the different features and applications of MS Excel for the use of data processing and visualisation.

#### **LCP 6- Expressive Art Therapy (EAT)**

This course offers a range of techniques of expressive art therapies and use it as a tool of advocacy for social change and personal well-being.

#### LCP 7- Medical & Psychiatric Social Work

This certificate course helps students to be familiar with concepts of normal and abnormal behaviours, psychiatric case assessment, symptomatology of common mental disorders, psychosocial aspects of various diseases, design appropriate interventions in various settings of its practice.

#### **LCP 8- Community Development**

This course helps learners to understand concepts of urban and rural planning, community development, Municipal Administration, Panchayati Raj and related theoretical frameworks.

#### LCP 9- Land Use and Disaster Risk Reduction

K. Loyola Extension Services (LES)
