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PART-I

INTRODUCTION

About NSS

National Service Scheme is under the Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports Government of India, popularly known as NSS was launched in Mahatma Gandhi's birth centenary year 1969, in 37 universities involving 40,000 students. The primary focus of NSS is the development of personality of students through community service. Today, NSS has more than 3.2 million student volunteers on its roll spread over 298 universities and 42 (+2) senior secondary councils and directorate of vocational education all over the country. From its inception, more than 3.75 cores students from universities, colleges and institutions of higher learning have benefited from the NSS activities as student volunteers.

The scheme now extends to all the states and universities in the country and covers +2 levels also in many states. Students, teachers, guardians, government, universities and colleges/schools and the people in general now realize the need and significance of NSS. It has aroused among the student youth an awareness of the realities of life, a better understanding and appreciation of the problems of the people. NSS is, thus, a concrete attempt in making campus relevant to the needs of the community.

Community service rendered by university and +2 level students has covered several aspects like adoption of villages for intensive development work, carrying out the medico-social surveys, setting up of medical centers, programmers of mass immunization, sanitation drives, adult education programmers for the weaker sections of the community, blood donation, helping patients in hospitals, helping residents of orphanages and the physically handicapped etc. NSS volunteers did commendable relief work during natural calamities/emergencies such as cyclones, floods, famine, earthquake etc. from time to time all over the country.

The NSS students have also done useful work in organizing campaigns for eradication of social evils, and popularization of the nationally accepted objectives like nationalism, democracy, secularism, social harmony and development of scientific temper.

OBJECTIVES OF NSS

The main objectives of National Service Scheme (NSS) are:

1. Understand the community in which they work
2. Understand themselves in relation to their community
3. Identify the needs and problems of the community and involve them in problem solving
4. Develop among them a sense of social and civic responsibility
5. Utilize their knowledge in finding practical solutions to individual and community problems
6. Develop competence required for group-living and sharing of responsibilities
7. Gain skills in mobilizing community participation
8. Acquire leadership qualities and democratic attitudes
9. Develop capacity to meet emergencies and natural disasters and practice national integration and social harmony

NSS & LOYOLA

Loyola College of Social Sciences was founded by the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) in 1963, the college offers courses in MA (Sociology, Social Work, and Human Resource Management) and MSc. Counseling Psychology. The college is affiliated to the University of Kerala and is a recognized research center of the university. The center prepares the students for Ph.D. in Sociology, Social Work and Management Studies and also takes up sponsored research projects. A full-fledged extension services, Loyola Extension Services (LES) is a unique feature of the college. The LES acts as the social lab of the college.

True to the Jesuit tradition of MAGIS (excellence) and the commitment to faith and justice, Loyola strives to reach the benefits of higher education to the people, especially the marginalized. In reaching this goal, we are guided by the Ignatius vision of life and its application in Jesuit education. NSS unit of the college has a history of more than 45 years. While Kothari Commission propagated NSS at the National Level, Loyola became

Instrumental in the establishment of NSS in Kerala University. Fr. Puthenkalam S.J, the first Principal of Loyola, took the pain for the initiation of the NSS programme in Loyola and the end fruit was unit KL-07-011, the functional NSS unit in the college. Voluntary membership of all the students joining the college is the uniqueness of the NSS unit of the college.

To build social sensitivity in the youth, NSS always promoted rural live in camps where the students live with a selected community for a period of 10 days to have a real life experience of that community. Later these 10 days is reduced to 7 days by the University. A seven-day group living with limited amenities and the interaction with the community, give the student a first-hand picture of the struggle, a common man in that particular community has to face, to make both the ends meet. Normally, a socio-economically backward are will be the priority. Loyola has a history of vibrant and live memories of camp life, cherished by the various batches of 1963 onwards. This year was also not different. Instead of 10 days, university stipulated a 7-day camp and it was realized from 26th February to 4th March 2018, at Pulluvila, a small coastal village near Vizhinjam.

DAIRY OF EVENTS IN THE PLANNING STAGE

As per the suggestion from Mr.Vathsyam Kunju, the admin of the WhatsApp group “PULLUVILA MAKKAL” and other natives of Pulluvila, NSS unit of Loyola College of Social Sciences decided to conduct our annual 7 day NSS camp “THEERAM” at Pulluvila,

Thursday 16th November 2017: Orientation about NSS camp Dr. Anitha.S, NSS Programme Officer gave a brief description about the history of NSS camps and its objectives. Fr. Sabu P Thomas oriented us about the functional and working groups. There was also sharing of experiences by previous Camp Leader Mr. Aloysius Antony and Ms. Balalekshmi. Later the camp leaders and working group leaders were selected. Mr. Abhishek. S & Ms. Merin Jacob were selected as the camp leaders. This was followed by planning functional committees about 45 minutes and presentation of the tentative plans was done. Fixing of programmes by the Programme officer and the Core committee along with group leaders had meeting at the college soon after the visit to make a tentative schedule of the programme.

Thursday 16th November 2017: Camp leaders visited Fr. Sabu P Thomas SJ, Vice Principal, Dr. Anitha. S NSS Programme officer, Staff guide Ms. Francina Xavier and Camp leaders Mr. Abhishek & Ms. Merin Jacob, in this meeting we finalized the programmes for the camp.

Friday 17th November 2017: Planning in functional committee for 45 minutes and planning of working groups for 15 minutes in Sutter Hall.

Monday 20th November 2017: Core committee meet together and finalized the matter for printing notice, banner etc.

Tuesday 21 November 2017: NSS Programme Officer Dr. Anitha. S, Staff guide Ms. Francina. P.X, Fr. Sabu P. Thomas. SJ, Vice Principal of the college, Mr. Abhishek. S camp leader, Ms. Merin Jacob along with group leaders visited the camp place. We had a meeting with local leaders, visited the priest of St. Jacobs Church, the community hall and other areas in the camp site. In the meeting with local leaders we mainly discussed problems of the community, areas to be focused during the camp. Pulluvila Makkal Whatsapp group members were active in the discussions.

Wednesday 29th November 2017: on the basis of discussion with community leaders, we organized an orientation for the volunteers about the different welfare programmes of Government of Kerala by Fr. Joye James S.J

Further activities and follow ups happened in the month of December and January

Wednesday 21 February 2018 : Second pre-camp visit was done by NSS volunteers. More interactions was done with the natives, Panchayath officials and other community members .It was a most informative and interactive visit. Data mining was an important agenda of this visit. Camp leaders also fixed the accommodation site for the camp during this visit.

22 &23 February 2018: Mock classes and interactive sessions were done by the volunteers. Skits, dramas and awareness classes were exhibited before the NSS programme officer Dr. Anitha. S and other teachers

26 February 2018: A final reminder and prayer by the vice Principal.

ORIENTATION CLASS

The first orientation class was on 16th November 2017. The meeting started at 3.30 pm. with an introduction about the NSS given by Dr. Anitha. S, NSS Programme Officer. After the introduction, Fr. Sabu P Thomas SJ, Vice Principal, Loyola College of Social Sciences, spoke on the history of NSS, the mission of NSS and the various services which the volunteers can provide for the community, the major issues in the community and the ways of addressing them. He suggested that formation of various groups such as Women, Children, Youth and Senior citizens would be good to identify the needs and also for facilitation of services. Following which Dr. Saji P Jacob addressed the meeting and Mr. Aloysius Antony and Ms. Balalekshmi, former NSS camp leaders shared their varied experiences about being a part of NSS. Soon after a meeting was conducted in which Mr. Abhishek S was selected as the camp leader and Ms. Merin Jacob was selected as the assistant camp leader. Fr. Sabu P Thomas SJ also talked in detail about the various groups, functional as well as working groups that the students will be sorted into and their respective duties. Moreover, the volunteers were divided into functional groups namely accommodation, camp paper, cultural, data processing, documentation, environment, food, finance, prayer/yoga, programme, survey. The members were asked to sit in their respective functional groups and plan for the camp based on the budget allocated to them after which the leaders of each group shared their plans with the whole group

Thursday November 2017 Mr. A. Ghosh trainer in Shuchitwa Mission gave us an orientation on waste management and different measures that can be adopted in Pulluvila during our camp. It was a very effective class. On 24th Friday November 2017 an awareness class on mental health was conducted by Smt. Susan Pradeep, senior counselor Pratheeksha Deaddiction Centre. She spoke about the importance of having a stable and healthy mind that enables people to overcome issues that comes in life. Next day 27th November Monday by 2:30pm Mr. G.V Hari took a class on group dynamics the session was very interactive and informative. He included many stories and games in his session. On Wednesday 29th November 2017 on the basis of discussion with community leaders, we organized an orientation about the different welfare programmes of Government of Kerala conducted by Fr. Joye James S.J. All these interactions and orientations gave the volunteers a great deal of courage and confidence about how to tackle the situations at the camp site.

PRE-CAMP VISIT

On 21st February 2018, a group of ten NSS volunteers along with Dr. Anitha .S, NSS Programme Officer, Fr. Sabu P Thomas SJ, Vice Principal, Loyola College of Social Sciences, Ms Francina Xavier staff guide went for a pre-camp visit to Pulluvila in the afternoon. There they arranged a meeting with Fr. Joseph Bastin, Parish Priest, St. Jacob's Church Pulluvila, panchayath president pulluvila, Mr. Thadheoose Pulluvila Makkal Whatsapp group. In the meeting we discussed the major issues the community faces and requested the group to find innovative ways to address these issues. Some of the problems they pointed out were alcoholism & drug abuse, lack of interest in pursuing education, waste management, stray dog issues, and ignorance about the different schemes of Government of Kerala etc. It was decided that some programmes to address all these issues discussed by the group would be included in the camping programme. We also visited the place of our accommodation St Jacob's Community Hall and also the camp site. The food, survey, programme and accommodation committee noted down the facilities available and made their plans accordingly.

Orientation of various schemes of government of Kerala: On 29th November 2017 from 2.30 to 3.30 pm Rev. Fr. Joye James SJ gave an orientation of different schemes of Government of Kerala. He mainly spoke about the programmes of Social Welfare & department of Social Justice and Empowerment. He distributed pamphlets and leaflets which explained about various formed representing members from different departments. The working groups planned their activities in groups. Schemes and helpline numbers etc. This was very useful for the NSS volunteers.

This was followed by division of NSS volunteers into working groups of 5 having 13 members each. The leaders of each working group were selected and were asked to make subgroups for survey. The survey subgroups were created and given orientations.

CAMP

Day 1, 26th February 2018

JOURNEY TO PULLUVILA

After a long wait, the much awaited day for first year NSS volunteers of Loyola College of Social Sciences, THEERAM 2018 started on 26th February, 2018. The preparations for the same started one week before. The programme committee, accommodation, survey and food committee started their background work early. The students reached at the college campus by 9.30pm and engaged in packing and arranging the necessary items for the camp. The students broke for lunch by 11.30am. There was a common discussion and prayer led by Vice Principal Fr. Sabu P. Thomas SJ and camp officer Dr. Anitha. S. As arranged by the accommodation and transportation committee, two buses were ready by 12.45pm to take the students to the camp sites. The students started the journey from college by 1.00pm and reached Pulluvila by 2.15pm.

The teachers and students were welcomed by the members of Pulluvila Makkal Whatsapp group and community members. The accommodation for all was arranged at the St.Jacob's Community hall, Pulluvila. A group meeting was held at 3.00pm and local community members were assigned to guide each working group. The students along with their respective guides went in their working groups to their field areas to invite the local people of Pulluvila for the inaugural function which was to be held at 5.30pm at Charathadi Purayidam.

Inauguration of NSS Camp THEERAM 2018

The inaugural function began with the recital of NSS Anthem by the Ms. Merin. The master of the ceremony was Ms. Jahanavi Nair. Dr Anitha S the camp officer of Theeram 2018 spoke about the objectives of NSS camp and welcomed the dignitaries and the gathering. Dr Saji P Jacob, Principal of the college delivered the presidential address.

The chief guest of the day was Deputy Collector and a former Loyolite Shri. Anu S Nair and he inaugurated the function. Then a street play on Good touch – Bad touch was performed by NSS volunteers. The keynote address was delivered by Fr. Joseph Bastin and ward member of Pulluvila panchayat Mr. Thadeivus spoke about Pulluvila. Fr. Sabu P Thomas spoke at the gathering and he made clear the motives behind choosing Pulluvila as the destination. The student co-ordinator, Mr. Abhishek proposed the Vote of Thanks. After that there was an array of cultural performance by the students of Loyola College of Social Sciences till 8.30pm.

After the cultural programmes the community members requested for a discussion regarding their expectations from our camp. A felt need has been raised by the community youth, that our camp has to help them in realizing one of their dream. In pulluvila they have so many youth clubs, they want to unite these clubs and develop solidarity among them. To pave way for that it has been decided to have an initial meeting tomorrow at Jaihind club. The meeting ended by 9.15 pm and volunteers returned to the camp site by 9.30pm. A dinner of kanji and payar was served by the food committee members at 9.45 p.m. It was followed by an extensive evaluation in which each member voiced their experience of the first day of camp life, the response of the community when they went for inviting them, the warm welcome they received, and also the problems and issues they noticed in the community such as alcoholism, lack of education, economic backwardness, thick population, waste disposal, sanitation, hygiene etc. The members were very happy with the accommodation and food that was served. Fr. Sabu P Thomas SJ, Dr. Anitha S camp officer, Ms. Francina gave their reflections about the camp. Then camp officer Dr. Anitha S instructed about the schedule to be followed on next day and assigned various duties to the different functional committees. The first day of the camp ended on a note of prayer after which the members dispersed for a refreshing and soothing caress of sleep.

Day 2, 27th February 2018

The second day of NSS camp kick started at 6 am. The students woke up at 6 am. Fr. Sabu P Thomas, Vice Principal made the students feel relaxed and refreshed through his yoga session which started at 7am. Flag hoisting ceremony was conducted at the community hall at 7.50am by camp officer Dr.Anitha.S. The message of the day was delivered by Abhishek Sathyan, camp leader. The documentation group presented the report of the previous day at 7.55am. Camp paper presentation was done by Fr. Sajan and team by 8am. Dr.Anitha.S the camp officer explained the programme schedule for the day. At 8.30am, the students assembled for breakfast. At 9am discussions based on guidelines for survey was conducted. The discussion ended by 9.30am, the students went for survey at 9.45am which continued up till 1pm.

CLUB MEETING

In line with yesterday's discussion Fr. Sabu P Thomas SJ, Dr. Anitha S, Ms. Francina and Assistant working group leaders went for the meeting at Jaihind club. The meeting started at 10am to 12.30pm. The main highlight of the discussion was in the community there are too many clubs co-ordinated by youth. The problem is all these clubs are formed with the objective to promote football. They all are very crazy about it. The community is very much worried that all the youth are after football and they are least interested with the development of the society. In this context the meeting has decided to visit each club leaders and ask them to come for a meeting next day. Accordingly all the team members disbursed and went to personally meet each club representatives.

At 1pm, the students assembled at the community hall for lunch. The NSS program coordinator of University of Kerala, Mr. Shaji A interacted with the students and spoke about the different initiatives of NSS such as Green Protocol, blood donation camp and organ transplantation. The session started at 3pm and ended by 3.30pm.

AWARENESS CLASS ON MENTAL HEALTH

An awareness class on mental health was conducted by Smt. Susan Pradeep, Senior counselor Pratheeksha De addiction Centre. She spoke about the importance of having a stable and healthy mind that enables people to overcome issues that comes in life. Several

practical aspects were discussed in the class regarding mental health. There was active participation from the community members.

AWARENESS CLASS AGAINST DRUG ABUSE

The awareness class against Drug abuse was taken by Shri. Jacob Varghese, Health Inspector, Nemom. Apart from talking just about drug use and addiction he spoke about the relevance of family values, mental health and stability. He also tried to spread awareness on other kinds of addictions like internet usage etc. The class was concluded by 7pm.

The students assembled back at the community hall and had their dinner at 8pm. The cultural program for the day was conducted to its fullest by group 1. The day was called off by evaluating the events, taking suggestions and opinions. After prayer everyone went to bed at 10.45pm.

DAY 3, 28th February 2018

The third day of NSS camp started on a positive note. The students woke up at 6 am. Ananthamadhavan of MSC counselling psychology made the students feel relaxed and refreshed through his yoga session which started at 7 am. Flag hoisting ceremony was conducted at the community hall itself at 7.30 am followed by NSS anthem. The report of the previous day was presented by Arunima.S. Camp paper presentation was done by Christansia and Alen Jose at 7.40 am. After day's briefing by the camp officer by 7.45 am the students assembled for breakfast. The students assembled back by 8.55 am there was a discussion based on the proceedings of the survey. The students made a general outline of houses to be covered so as to speed up the process. The students went for the survey by 9 am which continued till 1pm. At 2.30 pm, there was a meeting on survey tabulation. Miss Francina explained about tabulating survey information and sampling methods. This helped in creating a general outline of what to be done to formulate the findings of the survey. After this sessions volunteers divided into their respective working groups and went for survey.

AT THE FIELD

Group 1 has completed more than 60 houses. The main issue encountered by the group members was of waste management, open defecation, poor conditions of roads and

drainages. Their survey was in ward no: 1 and by the end of the day, including previous day's survey they completed around 163 houses. The remaining two members (Shilpa, Sooraj) attended the club meeting which was conducted at Jaihind club from 3.00pm to 5.30pm.

Group 2 has covered areas like Chembakaramanthura, P.P Vilakom and Charathadipurayidam. The whole team collected above 100 houses. The problems of these areas were improper waste management and drainage facilities. The assistant leader Jenin Koshy went for the club meeting conducted in the Jaihind club.

Group 3 was splitted with two people each for conducting survey. The group completed around 60 houses in ward no: 16. The major issues faced by the people in this ward was improper drainage system, stray dogs, improper waste management etc.

Group 4 completed filling 75 survey forms by visiting different families. The main issues in the areas covered were waste management issues, stray dog issues, open defecation etc.

Group 5 continued the survey from Kalasagar-Pallam. The people of this community were very co-operative towards the NSS volunteers. The group visited about 20 houses and had an interactive session with the members of the "Thozhilurappu Mission". They shared their problems with the NSS volunteers. Many of them do not have proper housing facilities and latrine facilities. Lack of permanent job was another problem faced by them.

By 12.30 pm the group members reached back for lunch. By 3.00 pm the group members continued the pending survey work.

AWARENESS CLASS ON WASTE MANAGEMENT

At 3.30 pm an awareness class on waste management was conducted by Sri. Ghosh P.S , who is the faculty of Suchithwa Mission. He mainly focused on the need to advocate minimum wastage and segregating degradable and non-degradable wastes. He also focused on the threats behind improper sanitation facilities and open defecation. He pointed out that human excreta is the most harmful waste that exist on earth. He suggested many solutions for these existing problems and he also discussed about healthy sanitation habits. Overall it was a very useful and informative session.

CAMP SITE

The students assembled back at the community hall at 6pm. They rested for a while and had dinner at 7.30 pm. The cultural programme for the day was conducted by group 2. The day was called off by evaluating the events, taking suggestions and opinions. The five different groups shared their reflections. There were major suggestions like conducting a social interaction programme where the natives along with panchayath members could discuss the issues. Waste management is an important concern for pulluvila. After prayer everyone went to bed at 10.45 pm.

Day 4 : 1 March 2018, Thursday

1st March 2018, Thursday, the fourth day of the camp began at 6am. Fr. Saji SJ refreshed the students, leading the yoga class that began at 7am. By 7:45, the flag hoisting ceremony was held, and the volunteers sang the NSS anthem. The message for the day was delivered by Fr. Suresh Babu. Volunteer Arya presented the previous day report and Najima, Nanditha and Fr. Suresh Babu presented the camp-paper. The volunteers had their breakfast by 8:45am and by 9:10, the students gathered for general instructions on field work.

DRAMA ON ANTI-DRUG ABUSE

The excise department has done a drama for the school students on the theme 'Ill-effects of Drug addiction' named 'Padivare Kakkaruthe'. It was organized in Leo XIII school. The drama was well taken by the students. The session began with an awareness class by Sri. Benchamin A J, Circle inspector of Excise, Neyattinkara. It was organized in the context of drug addiction and alcoholism among school students. It was an interactive session and several questions were asked by the students.

CLUB MEETING

The meeting including all the club members was arranged at Jaihind club at 10:30am. NSS Programme Officer Dr. Anitha, Fr. Sabu.P. Thomas SJ, Fr. Sji.SJ, Ms. Francina and assistant leaders of working groups gathered at a meeting at the Jai Hind. They discussed the possibilities of activities that could conjoin all their efforts for the betterment of the community standing united. After the meeting, the volunteers were divided to 3 groups, who visited and invited more club leaders for a meeting scheduled on 28-02-2018 at 03:30pm.

IN THE GROUPS

Group 1 went out for survey with their community guide, pretty excited because it was their last day of survey and the group had succeeded in completing the houses. The group split to pairs and finished survey in 20 houses of Ward 17. From the day's survey the volunteers found out that many of them are not aware of the potential each person possess, and about different health care schemes offered by the government. The most common problems shared by the people were improper drainage systems, stray dogs, waste disposal troubles and alcoholism.

Group 2 began their survey at 10am, fixing a goal of 250 houses. The 8 members of the group visited 24 houses in the P. P. Vilakom area. The common issues reported were waste management and improper drainage system. The members of the group found that their communication skills had developed, and realised the importance of confidence and empathy.

Group 3 went for survey by 10:30am, after completing the data tabulation process for the previous day. Divided into several sub-groups assigned different areas, the group surveyed around 50 houses in ward no 16. In the survey, the volunteers listened to the residents problems relate to waste management, lack of proper drainage facilities, in-availability of ration cards, etc.

Group 4 also left for survey at 10:30am, and almost finishing the survey, the group members also invited community members for the awareness class organized by the group in the evening and also for the Valedictory function on Saturday. The fore noon session concluded by 1pm.

Group 5 attended the meeting at 9:15am, regarding the data tabulation and received instructions and clarifications from volunteers Sajin and Shilpa of the survey committee. The group started for survey by 10:30am, guided by Antony of Kalasagar club and Ajith of Galaxy club.

The volunteers arrived back at the Community Hall for lunch by 1pm. After that, the volunteers gathered by 2:30pm to receive instructions concerning tabulation of the survey data and complete the process till 4:30pm. After finalizing their survey. The groups sat down to finish their tabulation work, except the members on Kitchen duty.

EFFECTIVE LEADERSHIP FOR SUCCESS IN LIFE

The volunteers gathered at the Swaraj club, along with a few members of the community for an enrichment session by Sri. George by 5pm. The session was targeted the youth of that area. The session was mostly on how a leader should be what are the essential qualities of a leader. The resource person was very proficient in Nandan pattu. Through nandanpattu and all it became very easy to reach the youth. They actively participated in it.

At 6pm, the group conducted a class on 'Positive Parenting' handled mostly by Najima and Sajin till 6:30pm. The many people who attended had been very attentive and the group has learnt in how to organize a class effectively. The fruitful and entertaining session ended on a positive note by 7:30pm

The camp had supper at 8:15pm. By 9:15pm, Group No.4 presented their cultural programmes. Following was the Evaluation session at its full swing the day, with volunteers having evolved to feel free to share their experiences. Sreejith, Sarath and Sujin opined how the camp has helped them to add to their confidence to face an audience. By 10:45pm, the camp retired to bed after prayers.

DAY 5, 2nd MARCH 2018

The day 5 started with yoga class initiated by Fr.Saji. The NSS flag was hoisted by camp Officer Dr. Anitha S., followed by the anthem by the volunteers. Group No. 3 presented the Camp Paper and Report of the previous day. The Food committee had prepared crispy poori and hot spicy aloo masala. One group of the volunteers had street play practice screened by Fr. Saji and Ms. Francina, to be presented at the different wards of Pulluvila by 5pm. There was a brief session for survey data tabulation after which the 5 working groups left to their respective areas.

SHRAMADHAN

The shramadhan was carried out at the pulluvila sea shore. The group members collected plastic waste dumped along the roads and sea-shore. A few groups reported that the public was very supportive and joined in the venture, whereas at some places, the public showed disinterest despite children joining in with the volunteers. Plastic waste becomes a severe issue here, when the plastic strewn across the beaches and complaints about no other way than to burn plastic is observed. Experience also makes evident that Pulluvila is not an Open-defecation free area. The beach-side is proof for substantiation, showing the lack of awareness and dire carelessness, resulting in increasing health issues.

MEANWHILE IN THE GROUPS,

Group 1, after tabulation process, left for 'Shramadhan' by 10am. The group collected waste in the plastic bags provided to them, and returned to camp for lunch. After lunch, the team sat down again to complete the tabulation. By evening, the group went out to field to conduct awareness classes, distributing informative pamphlets, and organising audience for the street play. The group was also able to organise participants for cultural events at the Valedictory function the next day.

Group 2, began their 'Shramadhan' at Charathadi Purayidom after 11am. Since the group had most of its members in the food committee, group1 received help from group2. With all the others, the group returned by 12:30pm to finish data tabulation before lunch.

Group 3 did with their tabulation process and left for field by 11am. They returned by 12:30pm after 'Shramdhan', helped by youth members of Pulluvila and Fr. Saji.

At lunch, delicious fried rice with pickle, pappad, salad and chicken curry awaited the volunteers. Fr. Saji's cousin and a former Loyolite, with her husband, in the vicinity had come visiting, and brought treat of ice-cream for all the campers.

STREET THEATRE

The volunteers with the guidance of Fr.Saji SJ and Ms. Francina P.X prepared for the street play. The theme was about drug addiction, alcoholism. In the evening Sri Sajith Babu sir visited our camp and he had an interaction with our students and sir was also part of the street play. Sir appreciated the efforts taken by the students. The street play was played at five different locations.

On the same day students also did awareness classes. Reshma conducted an awareness class on "Life-style diseases" and on "Girls' Hygiene". At 5:30pm, the group returned to field, inviting community members for the street play. Group member Anju Anna Geevarugheese took Life skills training session for a group of people, engaging everyone in interaction and games till the street play happened at 7:45pm. After returning to the camp, volunteers had dinner. After dinner cultural programs were conducted by the cultural committee. After this during the evaluation at 10pm, three members of each group made reflections. After evaluation and prayer everyone went to bed by 10.45 pm.

Day 6, 3 MARCH 2018

The day began fresh and clean with a nice hot tea by the food committee. At 7.45pm the flag was hoisted by NSS student coordinator Ms. Merin Jacob, followed by the NSS anthem. Ms Arunima from the documentation team read the report of the previous day. The camp paper was unveiled by the student coordinator and presented by Suresh and Sajan. At 8am, the camp had breakfast of upama prepared by volunteers at the community hall. After breakfast the camp packed up to accommodate the function happening at the community hall, shifting all their luggage and work to green rooms. The documentation committee, survey committee and the volunteers helping them stayed back at the community hall finishing work while the working groups set out for field. By 1 pm all the campers arrived at the Pulluvila CTC convent in groups for the delicious sadhya provided by a family at the community hall.

After lunch and visit to the St Jacob's church the campers returned to a community hall by 3pm and food committee set on their work for dinner. By around 4.20pm, seniors arrived there. By 5pm, the camp shifted to Charathadi Purayidam for the valedictory function.

VALEDICTORY FUNCTION

There was a good crowd gathered and groups of children practicing for the cultural programs. The program started at 6.15pm .Nikitha Ugin & Merin Jacob sang the NSS song for the function. Program officer Dr. Anitha. S, Rector and Manager of Loyola College Fr. Joye James SJ, Principal Dr. Saji. P. Jacob, Vice Principal Fr. Sabu .P Tomas SJ, Ms. Francina Xavier, Mr Shiju Pulluvila Whatsapp Group representative & Parish Priest Joseph Bastin were present for the function. Ms. Jahnavi. Nair was the master of ceremony. Programme officer Dr. Anitha S delivered the welcome speech. Ms. Nanma Manoj presented the Camp Report & Mr. Sajan MS presented the Survey Report. Fr. Joye James SJ spoke about the relevance of the findings of the Socio-Economic survey. Later Fr. Sabu. P Tomas SJ & Parish priest Joseph Bastin also delivered the speech. They shared their expectations, suggestions, ideas and dreams for the development and upliftment of the Pulluvila community. Later Ms. Francina Xavier delivered a speech with respect to her experiences and survey based suggestions. Mr. Shiju of Pulluvila Makkal Whatsapp Group delivered a speech thanking the College authority, NSS camp coordinators & volunteers for arranging a camp at Pulluvila and making it a grand success. Mr. Rethin handed over the memento to Dr. Anitha. S , NSS Programme officer as a token of thanks & gratitude. Camp coordinator Merin Jacob expressed her sincere thanks to the community for supporting and making the camp into a great success. After the official function there were a set of cultural programs conducted by the youth of Pulluvila. At 8.30pm we returned to the hall and had dinner. We had camp fire at 10.15pm followed by several fun activities and it lasted till 11:30pm. After camp fire everyone went to bed.

DAY 7, 4th MARCH 2018

The breakfast was served at 8:30 am. The last day of the camp started with usual prayer and yoga led by the prayer and yoga team .Group one presented their camp paper. The last day was for the evaluation and other camp activities.

EVALUATION

Evaluation started at 10 am after breakfast. Dr. Anitha. S NSS Programme officer gave an orientation about the different aspects of evaluation. The first 45 minutes was spent for individual evaluation. For that purpose, the NSS volunteers were asked to write about their views and opinions of the camp on a sheet of paper. After the individual evaluation, volunteers were asked to sit in their respective working groups and have a group evaluation where the comments made by the group members were noted down by the group leader and later on it was presented before others. After the group evaluation, there was evaluation by the leaders of functional group about their activities. Dr. Anitha S, NSS Programme Officer Mr. Abhishek Sathyan, the camp leader, Rev Fr Sabu P Thomas SJ, Ms. Francina P X, the staff guides shared their evaluation regarding the camp. The evaluation lasted for about 3 hours. After the evaluation there was a delicious lunch arranged by “PULLUVILA MAKKAL GROUP”. After the lunch, the NSS volunteers cleaned the camp site and by 2 pm volunteers bid farewell to PULLUVILA with lots of memories to cherish forever.

PART IV

SOCIO-ECONOMIC SURVEY REPORT - 2018

PULLUVILA

INTRODUCTION

Pulluvila holds its place in the outskirts of the Trivandrum city in the southern side of Kerala. It is situated in Karimkulam Panchayat of Neyattinkara Taluk in Trivandrum district. Their main source of livelihood is through the means of fishing. The history of Pulluvila is marked by the developmental activities that took place in the social, political and cultural aspects in the recent years. The various social service clubs and the societies along with the NGOs is doing their maximum to eradicate the problems, but their reach has a limited extent only.

Christian community predominates the spirituality of the people in Pulluvila. The Churches are an inevitable part of their life. St. Jacob Church in Pulluvila adds to the beauty of the outlined sea.

Recent surveys and analysis shows that the developments hitting the shores of Pulluvila are effective, but not remarkable though. Over recent years, people have been into the jobs of various fields other than fishing. This has made several changes to the socio-cultural and socio-economic backgrounds of Pulluvila.

OBJECTIVES

1. To understand about the socio-economic status of Pulluvila.
2. To understand the living conditions of people living in Pulluvila
3. To study their health status, life style diseases and the various addictions they are prone to.
4. To know the awareness level of people about waste disposal and the methods they adopt for waste management and the challenges they face due to improper waste disposal.
5. To analyze various activities of the Service Clubs available in Pulluvila.
6. To know the problems faced by people due to stray dog menace and the measures undertaken by the panchayat to prevent stray dog menace.
7. To provide suggestions for various developmental activities with reference to their socio economic status.

SURVEY METHODOLOGY

Pulluvila is situated in Karimkulam Panchayat of Neyattinkara Taluk in Trivandrum district. Karimkulam, Panchayath which is of 2.34 sq. km. area, has three main villages- Karimkulam, Kottukal, Kanjiramkulam which consists of 18 wards. The survey was conducted by the NSS volunteers from 27th February 2018 to 2nd March 2018. The selected wards for the survey were 1,15,16,17 and 873 houses were surveyed.

MAJOR FINDINGS

Exact number of houses covered was 873 and 993 families were surveyed. The total population surveyed is 4123, in which 1996 are males which accounts for 48.4% and 2127 (51.6%) are females. Infants found were about 8.5%, children 9.7%, adolescents 14.6%, Youth 24.5%, Elders 25.1%, middle aged 12.1%, old aged 4.9%. Among this, 99.5% are Christians and 0.4% are Muslims. 97.7% belongs to OBC caste, 1.6% General and 0.5% belongs to OEC category. About the marital Status, 51.1% are married, 43.8% are unmarried, 2.9% are widows or widower, 1.09% are divorced and 0.6% are those who lives separated from their spouse.

Regarding the educational qualification, 20% did their education till LP, 18% UP, 13.8% did their high school education, 13.4% SSLC passed, 10.1% Plus two passed. 5.9% did their higher education, 1.3% are Post Graduates, 2.1% did Professional education, 1.2% Technical education and 1.6% comes under “others” category. With respect to the occupational status, 37.6% are engaged in fishing related jobs, 16.8% are employed in Gulf Countries, 5% are skilled laborers. 1.3% are Government servants and businessmen.

Majority of the respondents (72%) have their monthly income under 6000- 10000(Rs) category, 11% under 3000-6000(Rs), 8.4% under 1000-3000(Rs) and the remaining 2.1% earns their monthly income above 30,000. With respect to their Ration Card status, majority of the families (73.4%) belongs to BPL category. 11.8% of them are disabled or handicapped individuals. Majority of them (84.8%) owns their land, 11.1% stays in rented house and the remaining 4% stays in their relative’s home. About the Cent in which their houses are constructed, most of their houses (64.4%) are constructed in 2-5 cent land, 11.7% between 5-10 cent land, 3% between 10-15 cent land and 2.7% of them have more than 16 cent land.

Regarding the type of house, 48.8% lives in terraced house, 21% under sheet covered houses, 18% in titled homes and the remaining 11.1% in thatched homes. Majority (91.1%) of the houses have electricity connection.

Majority of them (72%) uses their own toilets, 19% uses the community toilet available, and 8% of them does open defecation. With regard to the source of drinking water, 42.2% uses the bore well facility, 20% from their own well, 15% from others bore well facility, 17.8% from the community well, 5% from the public tap available. Majority of them (74.9) are drinking boiled water.

More than half of the men are victims of substance abuse or addictions. 52% are Alcohol addicts, 26% are drug abusers, the remaining 22% uses other types of addictions like tobacco, pan masala, snuff etc. An average of 3500Rs are spent monthly by them for the above mentioned substances.

Majority of them (88.8%) are not engaged in any type of vegetable cultivation.

Concerning about the life style diseases, 49.2% suffers from one or the other life style diseases mentioned below. 50.9% have blood pressure, 39.3% have diabetics, 29.6% from Asthma, 17.9% have cholesterol, 10% from heart disease, 10.7% from thyroid, 5.3% from Tb, 4.1% from cancer, 4.1% from kidney diseases, 4.6% from liver diseases. 50.7% of them have health insurance.

Majority of the parents do spent quality time with their children and 62% of them do enquire about their children's study related matters and take opinions from the concerned teachers. But, the level of control of parents over the children of age above 18 is much less.

Majority of the women are members of Kudumbasree unit and among them 53.6% have received trainings from the Kudumbasree unit.

87.4% of the respondents are satisfied by the visits and services of Asha workers.

47% and 57% of them are still suffering from stray dog menace and waste management issue respectively.

SUGGESTIONS

1. Improper waste disposal is the major problem found in Pulluvila. Proper measures need to be taken for waste management. Even though the women of Pulluvila are aware of the hazards of improper waste disposal, since there are no effective measures taken they dispose it in the sea. Though the panchayat has provided the plastic bags to collect and dispose household wastes, these bags are filled with wastes for the past six months, and they failed to recollect those bags. Due to the lack of scientific measures in sewage construction, many other issues like stagnant water, drainage block etc arise. Thus immediate actions should be planned keeping coastal areas at the focus point. At the same time awareness should be built regarding environmental protection and social hygiene among Pulluvila people.
2. The level of alcohol and drug addiction is not only prevalent among youth and elders of Pulluvila but also among the school level children. Thus the responsible authorities like Cultural and sports clubs, police should take immediate action to prevent usage of alcohol and drugs by children and to ensure this, certain actions like police patrolling during night hours.
3. Measures to be taken to decrease stray dog menace and by implementing proper waste management this issue can be reduced to an extent.
4. Provision for toilet facilities at each house should be ensured as open defecation is found as a major problem of Pulluvila, which is caused due to long distance to the community toilet available. Financial help as well as awareness regarding the hazards and the health issues caused due to open defecation should be given.
5. To provide awareness regarding the benefits of vegetable cultivation at home. The reason why they are not engaged in vegetable cultivation is due to lack of space. Also to provide financial help by the panchayat for effective vegetable cultivation within the limited space available. Provision of biogas should be ensured.

6. While giving permission to new houses, it should be ensured that septic tanks, biogas plants and rain water harvesting measures are constructed along with it.
7. Life style diseases are mostly seen in women and girls of Pulluvila as they don't do much physical labour as compared with the men and boys of Pulluvila. There is a high need to educate the women and girls about the importance of exercises, proper diet and their involvement in physical activities. Thus the panchayat, NGOs, clubs of Pulluvila must provide awareness classes and free medical check-up for them.
8. Provide proper street light facilities to the narrow roads of Pulluvila to reduce anti-social activities like sales of illegal drugs.
9. As sea resources are depleting and the inconsistencies in income there is a need provide educational trainings, PSC coaching, vocational trainings at school level and among youth, also to Skill development centre needs to be established in Pulluvila.
10. Measures needs to be taken to ensure people's participation in Grama Sabha
11. Encourage club activities and unification of clubs of Pulluvila, in order to bring social responsibility among the youth and to uplift their socio-economic and socio-cultural life.
12. Create awareness among the new generation and their parents about the creative aspects and responsible usage of mobile phones.
13. There should be more anganwadis in Pulluvila. Through which family empowerment shall be ensured.

CONCLUSION

All changes are not developments, development occurs when change happens for growth, and if growth is the aim, then more should be planned. Thus, for a planned movement, studies, discussions and debates are essential. Developmental programmes should be formed giving priority to factual matters. In brief, actions without proper planning and projects without needed action never leads to developments. Pulluvila village possess so much energy sources, which needs to be coordinated and should be utilized in the most effective way.

The survey report has been submitted by the NSS unit of Loyola College of Social Sciences and we hope that this document will not be under red tape. We hope that the suggestions provided will be considered for the better development of Pulluvila.

Part V

EVALUATION

DAILY EVALUATION

AWARENESS SESSIONS (11.30 am to 1.00 pm)

- **First session (children from 3rd to 7th standard)**

The trainees Mr. Anitha, Ms. Febina were the resource person for the session. There were 15 children. The session mostly focused on self awareness and it was dealt with stories and games. Some gifts were given to the children after the session.



- **Second session (children from 5th to 8th standard)**

Mr. Joby Kondoor was the resource person who took the classes for the children from the 5th to 8th standard. He was the child line coordinator in Trivandrum. The session for the children was conducted in the college auditorium. Up to 100 students had participated in this session. The welcome address was given by Ms. Saumya John. The session starts from 11 am and ends by 12.30pm. He had taken classes on the child rights. Not only the theory part was concentrated he too had shown many videos related to the child rights.



The session had started with a game and at first the children were not really cooperating in the beginning but after the game every one was interested in his class. Then he had started the class with a story and he had asked many questions from that story so that everyone was forced to listen that. After that story he had sung a song and it was repeated by the children.

The next session was on child rights. The class was really effective for the children he had asked some questions in the class and had shown some videos related to this. The session focused on right to survival, protection, participation and development.

In the final part he has shown another video related to good touch and bad touch. And he had explained about this and a good kind of awareness was imparted to the children regarding both the child rights and about the good touch and bad touch. After showing this video and the class he had concluded the session by doing an exercise. The exercise includes a song which everyone had to sing. Along with the game they were asked do some steps in such a way that he is performing so the children in that hall had performed a dance as well as they had sung along with him. After this the vote of thanks was proposed by Ms. Amritha Suresh. With this the session for the children was concluded.

- **Third session (Adolescents)**

The adolescent gathering was at Loyola school auditorium. There were around 120 adolescents who attended the session. The session started at 11.30 AM. There were three sessions for the group. The first session was handled by Fr. Saji Joseph SJ (Faculty, Loyola College). He presented two video clips with the message that age is not the limitation for doing things.



The second session was handled by Fr. Jose Pulinthanam SJ (vice- principal of Loyola School). He focused on to have an interactive session and dealt with the importance of self and the way we have to present self. Third session was handled by Mr. Manu (staff of Loyola School) he presented two video with the message of the importance of saving water and trafficking of children. The session was concluded at 1.00 PM with vote of thanks by Mr. Ekalavyan.

- **Forth session (Anganawadi workers, helpers, mothers)**

Sessions were arranged for the Anganawadi workers and mothers of Mangalapuram and Kadinankulam Grama panchayat were in there was an evaluation session held for the Anganawadi workers were they were given a platform to talk about the trainees performance in the fields and discuss their concerns and what are the issues that are to be addressed by the faculty or respected authorities. The Faculty members of MSW department Fr Sabu P Thomas, Dr Sonny Jose (HOD), Ms, Francina P X and Fr Saji took part in this session.



Later by 11.30 a.m., a session was held on the theme “stress management” by Ms. Anuja, who’s the Assistant professor of Trivandrum Medical College for the Anganawadi workers and mothers. She pointed out that it is necessary to know what we are. And she said that if we know who we are, then it will be easy for us to handle majority problems. She specified about the ways in which the Anganawadi workers must focus on work-load in their job place and they must have self awareness especially regarding their talents. Finding a good friend helps in stress management as when they reflect about their problems to their friends,

then you get relieved. She also made suggestions regarding avoiding the situations that they think should be avoided and taking alternative steps for handling the problems or coping up the problems.

This was followed by lunch.



CULTURAL PROGRAMES

The cultural programmes of children started at 1.45 PM. The programme session was compared by Ms. Amritha Suresh and Ms. Jayalekshmi. There were 28 programmes as listed (prayer song, folk song, mapila pattu, single dance, group

dance and nasik doll). A total of 28 programmes were conducted and 26 out of them were performed on onstage and the rest two was Nasik doll which was performed in the portico of the college after the valedictory function. The children from most of the Anganwadis had performed. Most of the programmes were fusion group dance and folk song. Both girls and boys had participated in the programme. The stage was open for the children to show their talents in all possible ways. At first there were only 27 programmes but later one programme was cancelled and then during the cultural, two programmes were added with the permission of the faculty and a single dance and group dance for boys. A small introduction was given to every programme, by the trainees while comparing. The programmes end at 3.30 PM. After the stage performance was over the trainees had informed about the Nasik doll, which will be held in the portico of the college.

The valedictory function started at 3.35 p.m. The welcome speech was give by Ms. Gilda Mani, programme coordinator, Fr. Saji Joseph SJ gave valedictory message. Ms. Francina P X felicitated and honored Mrs. Anija (ICDS supervisor of Manglapuram Panchayat) who is retiring from her service this year after her valuable service for the society. Ms. Sanumol Catherine Scaria read out a write-up of the supervisor.



Certificates for the participants were distributed after this.




Distribution of certificates

MA SOCIOLOGY: SURVEY AT ANCHUTHENGU (ANJENGO)



A qualitative survey was conducted under the leadership of the Department of sociology in Anjuthengu (Anjengo) Panchayat. The survey was conducted from 23rd -29th March 2017. This survey was undertaken by the college on request of Kudumbashree State Mission Program Officer of Trivandrum, Smt. Amrutha Glatson in order to evaluate the Asraya project and the working condition of Kudumbasree units. This was the first qualitative survey being conducted of Asraya project since its inception in 2003, in Kerala. Smt. Amrutha Glatson took a class on Asraya which included kudumbree – its formation, functions, and schemes and so on. Eradication of poverty was the main aim of the 10th five year plan, keeping this in mind the Asraya project was begun. The project aimed to protect those in extreme poverty, to rehabilitate destitute and to assimilate them into the main stream of the society. Beneficiaries were selected on the basis of a nine point scale, wherein they had to satisfy at least 7 points of these. According to the scheme for rehabilitation of the destitute, 67 families of Anjuthengu panchayat were selected as Asraya families. But Anjuthengu Panchayath has got provision only for food, treatment, and education. The selected members for this provision are 40 families, in need of food, 60 for treatment, and education for 15 students. The old and new lists of Asraya beneficiaries were received by the survey volunteers from the panchayat and the volunteers were divided into different that was to conduct the survey in the 14 wards. The volunteers conducted a survey totally in 194 Asraya families. Almost all the families from the given lists were recognized as

beneficiaries of the project, but a few were recognized as fake beneficiaries. More families were found as not included in the list but deserving of the benefits.

Major Findings:

Many of them are not living in their own land; some have no land and toilets.

People with disabilities were found in 4 families, their care takers are not concerned about their education and the treatment that should be given to them.

Two senior citizens in the list were rehabilitated to old age homes by the initiative taken by CDS.

Many were not even aware about the project.

Some of the families who are eligible for services have been included in APL list, even though these families are beneficiaries of the Asraya Project.

Most of the people are dependent on the daily wages, and MNGREP scheme to make a livelihood. The beneficiaries are not receiving supplementary food and other services from Anganwadi.

People depend on panchayat pipeline and public well for drinking water, but people are not able to carry water from there because of health issues.

Suggestions:

Medical officers have to be held accountable for the services, or alternate methods should be identified.

Pensioners find it difficult to spend money for travelling, to collect their pensions after started to reimbursed through banks. Hence, measure should be taken by panchayat to make pensions available for them at home.

Asraya project provides Rs. 200 for single member families, Rs. 250 for three member families and Rs. 400 for families with more than three members for the food kit. Since it is not enough to meet their needs there should be an increment in the money provided.

No proper vocational training and lack of expertise in job is a problem in the community. Hence, measures should be taken to ensure availability of vocational training for the community members.

Even though the state was declared Open Defecation Free State, more than half of the houses in Anjuthengu panchayat lack toilet facilities.

Steps should be taken to ensure that the CDS and ADS are made responsible for making people aware of the Asraya Project.

REPORT : POONTHURA VISIT

Objectives of the visit :

- To meet and listen to the people who were affected by the Okhi cyclone in Poonthura.
- To understand the current situation and condition of the area and people.
- To know more about the reality and to patiently listen to all that they have to share.
- To extend a helping hand to the people by being listener to their sorrow.

Activities

On 9th December 2017, the MSW students (1st year and 2nd year) of Loyola College Trivandrum went to Poonthura to meet the people who were affected by the Okhi cyclone. To know about the present scenario and to listen to the victims of the cyclone.

The group left the college by 3:00 pm and by 4:00 pm reached Poonthura. The team was taken to the nearby church and had an

opportunity to have the interaction with the vicar of the Poonthura church. The priest explained about the area. He started saying about the number of families staying in the 1 km radius. The students were shocked to hear that there are around 300 families staying in the locality and each and everyone of them is affected by the cyclone.

The priest also shared about the approach of the government. At first the govt didnot give much importance to the issue and that really affected the lives of the fishermen. It took away their faith in the govt. More than 150 people were out in the ocean on the day of cyclone and proper information was not passed to them during the time of the disaster. It put the lives of many families at risk. Many people lost one or two members of their family which seemed that some lost their husband, father, brother and son. The entire shore was in pain and the students were blank for sometime learning the situation of the people.

After the session, the students were divided into groups of 2 and the volunteers led everyone to each house especially the houses where the people went missing. The trainee had to visit the house of Selvaraj (35) who is the breadwinner of the family. The family consists of his wife and three children. The family has got no clue of him and he was missing since 29th November. He was once worked in UAE and they came & settled in India for the last 12 years. The family is still waiting for the father.

The family is now supported by Selvaraj's wife's family - her mother and sister are there for the family's support. The trainee had such a heartbreaking experience in the field. There were no answers for their questions and the only answer the trainee could give them is to pray for them. The whole family was wishing the govt will improve their systems as to avoid these kinds of situations in the future and everyone of them in the harbour is eagerly waiting for the missing ones to come back.

The experience gave the brancee an insight that
as human beings, no one have anything to boast on
and to be selfish, anything can go upside down
in an overnight & using the present time in the
right way is what matter at last.
